The Highlight of the Month Covid-19 Mitigation Rollback

Administration

• Covid-19 Mitigation Rollback. With the Governor's Executive Order 79 and the change in CDC guidelines, as of June 1st, the libraries are no longer limiting building occupancy and therefore no longer limiting patron stays to an hour. During the month of June, public furnishing will be brought back for public use, the number of public computers will be increased, and inter-library loan services resume. Later this summer, public meeting rooms will again be available for reservation and use.
